Right now, the cost of generating electricity is going up, mostly because the cost of natural gas is rising quickly. Those costs are passed along to WKRECC members through TVA's add-on fuel cost adjustment.

WKRECC's base rates haven't changed and this is not a permanent increase. As soon as production costs go down, the price we pay for energy will go down as well. Using less energy is the best way to combat higher bills.
